Our Speakers

SUSAN ROSENBERG

Susan, who has been with Petco for 15 years, is national grants and disaster relief manager for the foundation and, as such, reviews and makes grant decisions and develops disaster relief practices. She works closely with over 8,000 Petco Foundation charitable partners and over 1,200 Petco stores that manage abandoned pets and adoptions. As a regular presenter at animal welfare conferences and workshops, she is the face of the Petco Foundation. In addition to her responsibilities at the foundation, she is a director for several animal welfare organizations in San Diego and works with disaster relief management organizations nationally. She is also an animal handler for the Animal Rescue Reserve.

SUSAN GREENE

As a member of the shelter outreach team, Susan is the first point of contact for shelters and placement groups at Petfinder.com. Susan worked as a humane officer with the Tompkins County (NY) SPCA. She then spent 17 years in an academic setting, first in law enforcement and then with the biology department at Ithaca College. From 1990-2004 she ran a wildlife control and rescue business which stressed humane control methods and also handled feral cats. Due to an increasing number of requests for help with cats, the business became a feral cat rescue in 2004 and has successfully managed cat colonies to zero or near zero. She has presented on wildlife and feral cat issues at national and international conferences. Susan holds a B.A. degree in philosophy from Ithaca College and is completing an M.S. in communications. She lives in rural New York State with her six purrsonal cats, her dog, Molly, and a cat facility for formerly feral felines who are up for adoption on Petfinder.com.

JAN MCHUGH-SMITH, CAWA

Jan McHugh-Smith is the president/CEO of the Humane Society of the Pikes Peak Region, an open-admission organization with two facilities serving 28,000 animals annually throughout Southern Colorado. Jan's animal welfare experience over the past 28 years also includes being president of the San Francisco SPCA, CEO of the Humane Society of Boulder Valley, CO, and director of Eagle County Animal Control, CO. Most importantly she shares her life with her husband, son and three wonderful shelter dogs, Pepito, Flint and Molly.

GRANT GUGISBERG, D.V.M.

"Dr. Grant" Grant Gugisberg, D.V.M., is a 1991 graduate of the University of Minnesota. Licensed in five states, he left his dog and cat practice in 2007 and became owner of Parkview Cat Clinic, located minutes away from the Mall of America. Dr. Grant joined sheltering as one of 19 practices providing care to the local shelter. He conducted research and participated in national discussions on feline upper respiratory infections. His current interests include behavior and enrichment and internal and geriatric medicine. Along with his wife, Heidi, also a veterinarian, he provides sustenance and love to three cats, one dog, three geese, chickens and a therapy horse.

LEIGH SIEGFRIED

Leigh Siegfried is a certified pet dog trainer (CPDT-KA), shelter veteran and the owner of Opportunity Barks Behavior & Training, serving Greater Philadelphia and Northern Virginia and offering group training classes, private lessons and behavioral help for dogs and their owners. Shelter pros and shelter dogs have a special place in her heart, and she's happy to support those who are in the trenches.
