ADOPTION AMBASSADORS: THEY'RE LIKE US ... ONLY BETTER

As individuals and organizations committed to saving more lives today and tomorrow than we did yesterday, it's become increasingly clear that we need to look outside of our usual bag of tricks – and that we've long had an untapped resource right within our reach; namely, the very people in our communities who love and care about animals in need. KAREN DASHFIELD, DVM

JEFFERSON TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL POUND

Dr. Karen Dashfield is a shelter veterinarian with 25 years of experience designing disease control programs for shelters, kennels, and wildlife rehabilitators throughout New Jersey. She is the Supervising Veterinarian for the Jefferson Township Municipal Pound and through her Veterinary House call practice she provides consultation and animal care for numerous shelters and rescues including Friends of Ferals, Byram Animal Rescue and Kindness Squad, Shelter Showcase, and Liberty Humane Society. She has served as a Volunteer Medical Director for the Best Friends Animal Society NY Super Adoptions since 2010. Dr. Karen also works closely with the members of the New Jersey Association of Wildlife Rehabilitators and is the recipient of their 2015 Lifetime Achievement Award. As the Director of the Sussex County Animal Response Team (CART), she initiated and ran a shelter for Hurricane Katrina Dogs in 2005/2006 that received, re-homed, and reunited over 200 animals. She prepares future animal control officers, shelter workers, and wildlife rehabilitators through her teaching for Career Development Institute, and at local and regional conferences. Karen shares her home with her four dogs, Red, Delilah, Sadie and Pollywog, and a cat named Princess.

SUSAN COSBY-JENNINGS

PETCO FOUNDATION

Susan Cosby-Jennings is the Director of Lifesaving Programs & Partnerships with the Petco Foundation. Her career in animal welfare includes working at both large and small, urban and suburban, animal control and limited admission shelters. Before coming to the Petco Foundation her last animal sheltering position was Executive Director of ACCT Philly, managing a large, poorly resourced, urban animal control shelter. Prior to that she held roles as President & CEO of the Pennsylvania SPCA, Executive Director of the Animal Welfare Association in NJ, and Chief Operating Officer of the Philadelphia Animal Care and Control Association in PA. Originally coming from the retail field, she has utilized customer service oriented and data driven strategies to improve shelter lifesaving.

B.J. ROGERS

ASPCA

B.J. oversees field-facing communications for the ASPCA through channels such as ASPCApro.org, online learning, and national life-saving initiatives. B.J. joined the ASPCA in 2011 and previously served as Senior Director of ProLearning and as Community Initiatives Director where he provided support, training, and grant assistance to shelters in a number of northeastern/mid-Atlantic states as well as serving as liaison to the Shelby County, AL Partnership Community. Prior to joining the ASPCA, B.J. was the chief executive of the Humane Society of Chittenden County, in northern Vermont.

B.J. has worked in the human service sector as both an executive director and community relations director, in higher education as both an instructor and researcher, and in politics as senior campaign staff and Press Secretary for a gubernatorial campaign. He's a longtime member of the Samara Fund of Vermont's Scholarship Committee, and is a former board member (and Executive Director) of Outright Vermont – both organizations dedicated to support and service for LGBTQ youth. He also served on the board of the Vermont Humane Federation and the Advisory Council of the New England Federation of Humane Societies for nearly 10 years. He's a Certified Animal Welfare Administrator (CAWA), a Certified Dialogue Education Teacher (CDET) and has training in both mediation and Appreciative Inquiry. B.J. lives near the shores of Lake Champlain in Colchester, VT where he and his wife Erin share their home with two four-legged kids.

Karen Owens brings 16 years of professional dog training experience to her work with shelter dogs.
